No ID? You can apply for free voter ID

Voter ID

Are you ready to vote in the local elections in May?

The Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at some elections. This new requirement will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote?

You may already have a form of photo ID that is acceptable. You can use any of the following:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional licence)
- Blue badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards (including Kent County Council Bus Pass; Disabled Person's Bus Pass)
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric immigration document
- · Defence identity card
- · Certain national identity cards

If you don't have an accepted form photo ID

If you don't already have an accepted form of photo ID you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate. You can apply for this at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk

Alternatively, you can complete a paper application form and send this to the Electoral Services team at the Council (address opposite).

Council finances are under severe strain due to soaring inflation and funding cuts. We responded quickly with an In Year Budget Review to take urgent action on the funding shortfall, increasing revenue by

Funding for the Changing Places facility came from money awarded to the Council from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities' Changing Places public toilets initiative.

The toilet is fitted with specialist healthcare equipment including an overhead hoist system, adjustable wash basins, changing benches, and grab rails, all helping to ensure that those with additional needs have a space with more enhanced support than is available in standard accessible toilets.

A lasting tribute to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth

The Mayor, Councillor Godfrey Bland, has planted a tree in Dunorlan Park, Tunbridge Wells in honour of the late Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth.

Fittingly, the tree chosen, Acer platanoides Emerald Queen, was planted in compost made from the floral tributes to Her Majesty left by members of the public outside the town hall in Royal Tunbridge Wells following her death.

Godfrey, was joined by Mrs Georgie Warner, Deputy Lieutenant of Kent to plant the tree in the grass in front of the lake on the Pembury Road side of the park.

'The tree commemorates Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's 70 years of service to the country. It is in keeping with the idea of legacy that the flowers which were left in Her Majesty's memory become part of this lasting tribute.' Godfrey Bland

The tree is part of the living legacy in honour of Her Majesty, joining over a million trees already planted across the UK as part of The Queen's Green Canopy.



Help for A Households

Community Support Fund making a difference to residents

The Community Support Fund was created by councillors in response to the cost-of-living crisis which is directly impacting upon many of the most vulnerable households in the borough.

Grants from the £100,000 fund have now been awarded.

The range of organisations who received grants means the money will reach those who need it.

Charlie's Angels Kitchen is using the grant to provide additional hot meals and ingredients for people to make their own meals at home.

The Tunbridge Wells & District Volunteer Bureau will provide access to online services to elderly and vulnerable people in their own homes.

Nourish, well-known to many for the support they already provide, applied to the fund so that they could continue to distribute fuel vouchers to those in need of emergency support. Without the grant Nourish would not be able to provide fuel support.

Number One Community Trust is increasing their offer of subsidised hot meals for children and extending opening hours to provide a warm space for anyone who needs it as well as continuing their preschool provision and family and holiday support.

The parish larders which were given a grant will continue their existing provision during this period of inflation and increased demand for their services. As well as supporting families, larders are very important in helping reduce food waste.

West Kent Mind asked for the grant to be able to increase their capacity to provide free, fast-track access to counselling services for vulnerable people experiencing domestic abuse who need mental health support.

Here is some inspiration for things to do from Visit Tunbridge Wells.


Bluebells and railways

Starting in the Tunbridge Wells Commons, walk part of the **Tunbridge Wells Circular going** via High Rocks to Groombridge (approx. 1h30 walk). Arriving at High Rocks, we recommend you explore a hidden gem for bluebell spotting. Through the main car park, into the woods, you will find a palette of blue and purple tones. After a spot of lunch, continue onto Groombridge via Groombridge Place and Enchanted Gardens. Keep an eye out for the peacocks and deer that roam the property. If you are feeling adventurous, you can continue the trail back to Royal Tunbridge Wells or simply hop on board the Spa Valley Railway for a leisurely return!

Spring watch

As we are in the Garden of England. spring is the time of year when our borough's countryside looks its best! Hidden behind a bright green door, you will find Water Lane near Hawkhurst. A beautifully curated walled garden growing seasonal fruit and vegetables as well as an array of flowers which you can purchase in their boutique. With a farm to table concept, you can also sample some of the delicious produce growing around you.

We are fortunate to have two National Trust properties in our borough with award winning gardens and luscious grounds to explore. Climb the Sissinghurst Castle tower to marvel over the gardens, offering a new perspective on the surrounding countryside.



Make the most of the free entry to the estate and woodlands of Scotney Castle (parking booking required). It offers a perfect afternoon walk in an ever-changing woodland. Be sure to look out for the moated castle in the distance and the only working Oast House in the National Trust.

A large scale triple screen immersive video installation by the artist Kelly Richardson. As part of a collaboration with the Arts Council Collection, through the Borrow Big! scheme, the presentation of Leviathan at The Amelia Scott will

be the first time the work has been exhibited since being acquired by the Arts Council Collection in 2015.

Leviathan was commissioned by Artpace, San Antonio. The work draws on Richardson's distinct art practice which focusses on ideas around conservation and a careful observation of the effects of humanity on the planet. She films the bald cypress trees, indigenous to Caddo Lake in Uncertain, Texas, and manipulates the footage,

creating a series of twisting, snakelike tendrils of yellowish light in the water with an eerie soundtrack replacing the sounds of nature.

Richardson explains, 'I'm trying to create contemplative places which are both beautiful and mesmeric. but at the same time, unsettling."
